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

The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) — Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People — all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope.

Received during the season of Lent (March 5 – April 20), each gift to OGHS helps to improve the lives of people in these challenging situations. The Offering provides us a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need. In fact, OGHS is the single, largest way Presbyterian come together every year to work for a better world.

# PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE (PDA)

- Works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters, and support for refugees
- Receives 32% of funds

#### PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM (PHP)

- Takes action to alleviate hunger, care for creation, and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed
- Receives 36% of funds

#### SELF-DEVELOPMENT OF PEOPLE (SDOP)

- Invests in communities responding to their experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these issues
- Receives 32% of funds



### OUR OFFERINGS AT WORK

#### PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE (PDA)

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). It enables our congregations and mission partners to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crisis and catastrophic event. #### Matthew 25 continues to be a guiding force in the work of PDA.

- supporting the eradication of poverty through grants to vulnerable populations
- working to end systemic racism through centering Black, indigenous and communities of color and refugees in our grant-making
- promoting congregational vitality through volunteer work teams, Story Ministry, spiritual and emotional care for pastors and grants to help congregations respond in their own communities
- addressing climate change, militarism and other forms of oppression.
- In 2023, PDA granted \$6.1 million in 27 U.S. states and 46 countries.
- 131 National Response Team members were deployed to 46 presbyteries.
- 1,837 work team volunteers served in AR, CA, FL, KY, LA, MS, NC, TX and Puerto Rico, donating 127,755 hours, totaling more than \$4 million in volunteer time.
- PDA provided more than \$256,000 in Migration Accompaniment Ministry grants in the U.S and presented Emotional and Spiritual Care programs to more than 300 participants.
- In partnership with Church World Service, 116,273 Gift of the Heart Kits and blankets were distributed.

PDA's Migration Accompaniment Ministry visited partners in Central Europe who minister to and with Ukrainian refugees and those displaced to western Ukraine. Meanwhile, violence in Khartoum sent South Sudanese refugees back to their young homeland, and forcing Sudanese to flee to Egypt and Chad where PDA partners were ready to receive them. In the U.S., attention was given to: legal services and advocacy to allow Afghan refugees to remain here, advocacy for more humane border policies, and grants to support faithful responses to asylum seekers in interior cities.

Counter Stories Productions continued work on the industrial pollution and environmental racism documentary, as well as a new short documentary focused on eviction and homelessness through the voices of children and families in Dayton, OH. Pre-production began for a new documentary focused on gun violence. Trouble the Water: Conversations to Disrupt Racism and Dominance is being edited into a feature length documentary for wider distribution across streaming platforms. Flint: The Poisoning of an American City reached the Fifteen Million Streaming Milestone since its wide release in 2020.

# Due to climate change, natural disasters are intensifying in frequency and scale.

**Nationally**, initial grants supported recovery from wildfires, tornadoes, flooding, hurricanes and storms in thirteen states. Some grants also addressed public violence, disaster preparedness and church property that was damaged due to disasters. National Recovery grants were given in fifteen states. There are now eleven PDA Volunteer Host Sites and three referral sites for volunteer work teams.

Internationally, grants supported humanitarian response to war/conflict in Ukraine, Israel/Palestine, Myanmar, Sudan, Ethiopia and more; earthquake response in Haiti, Syria, Afghanistan, Indonesia and Nepal; drought and famine in Angola, India, Malawi and Rwanda; flooding, hurricanes and storms in the Dominican Republic, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Ghana, Malawi and more.

#### PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM (PHP)

In 2023, you helped PHP give 84 grants totaling \$1.1 million, impacting 19 countries and a territory, including the U.S. and Puerto Rico. PHP also partnered with

- 12 Presbytery Hunger Action Advocates,
- 80 Hunger Action Congregations and
- 304 Earth Care Congregations across the U.S.

Our work resourcing Presbyterians and the work of our partners is difficult to quantify within a year; long-term sustainable development, community empowerment and policy change take many years. This snapshot offers just a few examples of work funded in 2023 and how your gifts contribute to a more just world and well-being for all God's people and Creation. We are grateful for the scope of work the One Great Hour of Sharing ministries are able to accomplish together through your generous gifts (OG30000). #### These projects are a few examples of work supported by the Presbyterian Hunger Program in 2023:

**ASOFENIX in Nicaragua** implemented a solar refrigeration initiative for fish production and was welcomed by the entire community.

The solar refrigeration system allows people like Mercedes del Socorro Mora Ruiz, a 31-year-old fisherwoman and mother, to have access to ice in the community to keep the fish fresh. "It was definitely tiring and tedious having to travel to Menco to look for ice. The entire morning was lost, and sometimes even the entire day, because sometimes due to blackouts we could not find ice," said Ruiz. In addition to fishing, Ruiz can now preserve fresh fish for longer and market it at a better price due to the quality of the product. This project allows many to increase fish production and economic income to ensure the well-being of families.

The Coalition of Immokalee Workers' (CIW) Fair Food Program, launched in the tomato fields of Florida, today prevents the very worst human rights abuses — modern-day slavery, sexual assault, child labor and physical violence — not just in tomatoes and not just in Florida, but in a multiplicity of new crops, 10 new states and even three new countries!

CIW has also been working in Scotland and Northern Ireland in collaboration with the International Transport Workers Federation to launch a "Fair Fish Program" pilot in the UK fishing industry — an industry with extremely dangerous working conditions for immigrant fishers from Ghana, the Philippines and Indonesia, many of whom toil at risk of modern-day slavery and other harsh abuses.

Tewa Women United in Santa Cruz, New Mexico, engages in protecting the health and safety of Indigenous and other vulnerable communities residing near extractive projects. Their efforts have led to work with youth, Pueblo Women Farmers and other local community members. Tewa developed a curriculum focused on native plants, which was then taught to third- and fifth-grade kids from Santa Clara Pueblo. As part of the curriculum, students were instructed to cultivate tomatoes, corn, beans and squash in the spiral garden located at the Espanola Healing Foods Oasis. Additionally, Tewa engaged in discussions with young residents of the Española Valley and attentively considered their apprehensions about the catastrophic ecological consequences of Los Alamos National Laboratory and the ongoing nuclear colonialism that deeply impacts the soil and air in communities downwind of Los Alamos.

Tewa organized a Pueblo Women in Farming panel discussion, which revitalized the profound spirit of self-sufficiency among individuals who play a crucial role in sustaining their communities through seed cultivation. They devised a plan to sustainably assist individuals involved in food production and promote the movements advocating for Indigenous food and seed sovereignty resources across Indian Country.

#### **BOLD Justice in Fort Lauderdale, Florida**,

prioritized expanding the tree canopy in low-income neighborhoods that lack trees. The community felt this work was important because low-income neighborhoods have the lowest rate of tree canopy, making them the most susceptible to heat-related problems like heat stroke and high cooling bills.

BOLD Justice was able to get a commitment from the county to provide funding for 500 trees to be given away. The tree giveaways are being hosted at BOLD Justice congregations.

ACREST in the Bamboutos Mountains of Cameroon

distributed 250 improved stoves and 50 water filters, bettering health in 26 villages. The stoves consume less wood, reducing deforestation, and the water filters increase access to clean water for drinking, cooking and bathing, reducing the incidence of waterborne illnesses.

**RELUFA mobilized communities in Batouri, Eastern Cameroon**, to stand up for their rights in the face of

the failure of mining companies to safely close mining operations and reclaim lands that have been mined. Communities are literally hanging over the edge of open pits, and every year, children, families and animals fall into the pits and die. There are also detrimental public health impacts from the contamination.

The Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People works with low-income communities to overcome oppression and injustice. In 2023 National SDOP entered into partnership with the projects below. Projects focus on advocacy; youth-led initiatives; skills development; farming; refugee issues and capacity building. ## 3 PROMOTING OGHS: BEFORE THE OFFERING

#### **PLAN**

Life is easier when a plan is in place. If you make arrangements ahead of time, promotion will go more smoothly, be less stressful, and you'll make the most of every opportunity to motivate your congregation to share and support OGHS.

- **Set dates** to receive the OGHS Offering with your session. Congregations commonly receive the Offering on Palm Sunday (April 13) and/or Easter Sunday (April 20), though any date is appropriate.
- Aim for a higher goal than the sum raised last year.
- **Unpack your shipment** of materials and review the next page to find other tools and resources to help you develop your plan.
- Call Customer Service at 800-541-5113 or email customer\_service@presbypub.com to order any additional materials you may want or need.
- Recruit a church member to read a Minute for Mission or use the videos found online.
- **Distribute the fish banks** and use the children's Sunday school curriculum during lent for a fresh approach to this year's One Great Hour of Sharing. You can download a children's Sermon, lessons with activities, and ideas to connect worship and the congregation.
- Use the Gracie the Fish story with your Sunday School class.
- Visit our website, pcusa.org/oghs/resources, for recordings of minutes for mission, worship resources and many other helpful resources.

#### **BE CREATIVE**

Your creativity and voice are important parts of this process. We'll never know your congregation the way you do. What kind of activities do they love?

- Make a promotional board or display! Remember to tag us on Facebook when you post pictures of your congregation's OGHS display.
- Plan special congregational events, such as church and school activities. Popular events include dinners or mission fairs highlighting OGHS-supported ministries, and events promoting "PDA Blue Shirt Sunday" on March 9, and "SDOP Sunday" on March 16.
- Create a plan for involving your children in promoting the Offering using the Gracie the fish story or the Sharing Calendar. Use items in the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to present to the congregation, sharing how this gift can make a difference for others.
- Challenge other congregations in your area. Here is an example of how it can be done. presbyterianmission.org/story/fishing-derby-baits-one-great-hour-of-sharing-participation.
- Think about how you can **integrate all of the worship resources** into your service holistically rather than as add-ons to emphasize the central role our witness in the world plays in our own discipleship. These are available in English, Spanish and Korean.

### PROMOTING OGHS: DURING THE OFFERING

- Hang the Offering poster in a prominent location, if you have not already created a display.
- Place a folded insert in the Sunday bulletin every week. There are two inserts which you can use interchangeably or however you wish. We suggest using the same insert for multiple weeks if you are promoting all month.
- Put Offering envelopes in pew racks every week.
- Present Minutes for Mission, and encourage your members to give generously, with reminders of the goal you set with the session.
- Use the worship resources found on the website.
- Involve children and youth and ask them to hand out bulletin inserts as an alternative to placing them in pews.

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

#### SHOWING UP FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Lyndsay Sullivan knew right away that she had found her people, her community. When her ride didn't show up after a meeting she was attending, she was invited to an ADAPT Chicago meeting. At that meeting, she immediately recognized she had made a life-changing connection.

Today, Lyndsay, who lives with a disability herself, is the co-coordinator of ADAPT Chicago, a 501(c)4 nonprofit that "organizes disability rights activists to engage in nonviolent direct action, including civil disobedience, to assure the civil and human rights of people with disabilities to live in freedom."

ADAPT Chicago is one of nine organizations under the umbrella of the Alliance for Community Services (ACS), a grassroots, member-led organization. ACS was formed when public aid offices were being closed and Medicaid benefits were being cut around the state. ACS works to bring together people with disabilities, low-income families and front-line service workers to resist threats, identify common ground and put the "human" back in human services.

The work of ACS is made possible, in part, through a grant from the PC(USA)'s Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People, which is in turn supported by your generous gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing. At the mid council level, the Presbytery of Chicago's Committee on the Self-Development of People is hands-on with ACS.

The presbytery's SDOP Committee co-moderator, Hope Daniels, shares that the Alliance for Community Services looks for ways to get things done politically, because people are having things done to them without being a part of the process.

In 2024, members of ACS met with Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson to address the inequities in the taxi industry. Lyndsay said that able-bodied people could call a cab, and it would arrive in two to three minutes, but people with disabilities were waiting for an hour in certain places, and that wasn't right.

"The mayor agreed, and he said that we need to look for ways to incentivize the cabs to take more wheelchair riders."

Lyndsay added that the reason she stays involved with ACS is that it's an entirely volunteer, grassroots organization, which makes her, if not exactly "excited" to be disabled, then proud.

"Because I am completely disabled, I consider my job to be doing the stuff I do with the Alliance and ADAPT Chicago," Lyndsey said. "We are attacking problems and finding solutions. That's what we do."

What can we do? We can each give as much as we can to One Great Hour of Sharing to help those like Lyndsay and ACS who are working hard to assure the civil and human rights of all people. And when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

#### **EMPOWERING INDIGENOUS WOMEN BRING HOPE AND HEALING**

When Nathana Bird chose to follow a passion for community organizing, she found a path that led her home to New Mexico.

Raised in Ohkay Owingeh, Nathana was looking for deeper purpose and connection with people from backgrounds like her own.

She was trying to find her story within the narrative of her people, to embody the wisdom that has been passed down to her from the mothers and grandmothers in her life.

Like Nathana, Talavi Denipah Cook, also originally from Ohkay Owingeh, had left to study environmental and conservation biology, but ultimately found the pull of her people to be all but irresistible.

She wanted to help the people know how to connect with the earth, work to combat climate change, and do better for the world.

Both of their journeys led them to Tewa Women United (TWU), a multicultural, multiracial, non-profit organization founded and led by Native women, where Nathana currently serves as interim executive director and Talavi as program manager for Environmental Health & Justice.

Named for the Tewa concept, wi don gi mu, which translates to "we are one," the organization is committed to strengthening leadership for Native women and girls, addressing environmental, social, racial and gender justice concerns, shaping policy, and reclaiming the people's agricultural legacy.

And it is thanks to a grant from the Presbyterian Hunger Program, made possible by Presbyterians' generous gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, that TWU's life-giving initiatives bring hope and healing to Indigenous women and girls while its food justice programs help connect youth with their elders, their people's traditions and the land.

TWU began as a group of women from mainly the Tewa-speaking Pueblo communities around a kitchen table to confront systems of oppression and patriarchy. They wanted to create a space for women to uncover their own power and encourage them to use their voice to create change in the community.

TWU supports efforts for environmental health and climate change adaptability by creating community gardens, heirloom seed libraries, non-GMO seed exchanges, traditional agriculture, and bio and mycoremediation practices. They also address the destruction that happens on their ancestral homelands and sacred areas and the violence that has been inflicted on their bodies and their land.

Nathan shared, "This work inspires me because I have three daughters and one son, who know this is their place. But it's also for all the young girls that come after me — that grow up here and connect back to their Tewa and cultural roots."

Helping neighbors in need around the world in tangible ways to share God's love is why we do what we do. And when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

#### FROM DISASTER TO HOPE

High in the mountains of Nepal, hundreds of remote hill villages dot the landscape in a terrain that is as precarious and vulnerable as the people themselves. People like Dilliram Bhatta [dill-i-ram bot-tah].

The village of Gorkha, where Dilliram and his family live, has historically had no source of clean drinking water. He and the other villagers regularly walked 45 minutes down the hill to get water for their households and livestock and then carried it back up. Water scarcity became even worse for the village when a massive earthquake hit Nepal in April 2015.

The unprecedented disaster caused catastrophic damage, including the destruction of the village's closest water supply, leaving the families no choice but to travel even farther for water. Their appeals to the local government for a solution to their water crisis proved fruitless.

But Juneli Nepal [joon-eh-lee] — a small nonprofit run primarily by women — heard their cries. Under the leadership of its president, Anjila Khadka, the organization works to empower Nepalese communities and individuals by addressing such systemic issues as inadequate infrastructure and lack of access to education, skills training, health-care services, proper hygiene, basic human and women's rights and disaster preparedness.

To address the village of Gorkha's immediate needs, Juneli Nepal worked in collaboration with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) and the local government to provide the village with its own water supply. By 2018, 75 households were provided with safe, clean drinking water.

The humanitarian mission of Juneli Nepal is made possible, in part, through a grant from PDA, which is in turn supported by Presbyterians' generous gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing.

Juneli Nepal aligns with PDA's values of compassion, collaboration and empowerment, working alongside communities to rebuild infrastructure, restore

livelihoods and strengthen resilience against future disasters. The villagers appealed for the drinking water, and thanks to PDA, Juneli Nepal was "happy and lucky to solve the problem," Anjila said. And because of gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, life for the villagers has steadily begun to improve.

This is a very tangible example of how this Offering enables us to provide support in times of crisis as well as work toward long-term development.

Anjila shares an important message with us all when she says, "Giving generously to One Great Hour of Sharing is a way to live out the Christian values of compassion and service. It reflects the call to love and support our neighbors, both locally and globally, without any discrimination, in line with Jesus' teachings."

Through One Great Hour of Sharing, we extend God's love to the most vulnerable. Please give what you can — because when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.
