Best Practices for Mission Partnerships

(Based on a framework provided by the Kenya Mission Network and the Presbyterian Church of East Africa)

I. Spiritual Development

- A. Set spiritual development as a foundation
 - o Begin and end meetings, gatherings, conferences and phone calls with prayer
 - o Worship together
 - Exchange sermons
 - Exchange pastors
 - o Share Bible study partners can alternate writing the Bible study
 - o Share devotionals can be written by partners
 - o Share prayer requests
 - Share simultaneous prayer times for specific prayers
 - Use tangible reminders for prayers between partners, such as bookmarks, wristbands, pins, etc.
 - Share partnership concerns and joys in weekly bulletin, newsletter, announcements from the pulpit or during worship
 - o Hold spiritual retreats

II. Relationship Development

- A. Remember that communication is key to keeping the partnership alive
 - o Establish a regular basis of communication
 - o Use technology to connect with partners
 - Phone call/conference call, email, Skype, Zoom, Facebook, blog
 - Skype worship services
 - o Record worship services and share by mail, CD, DVD and online
 - o Practice candid communication with partners, especially when sharing what does and doesn't work
 - o Include the home congregation by publicizing information about the partnership (bulletin boards, newsletters, bulletins, websites, etc.)
 - o Be intentional about ways to share partnership trip experiences upon return home

B. Be in community with partners

- o Listen, ask questions, don't just "do"
- o Facilitate partner exchange visits (both ways)
- o Have Bible study, even when apart
- o Participate in home stays when visiting one another
- o When together, worship, share meals, play games and hold discussion groups on topics of shared interest
- o When working on a project, work side by side
- o When partners visit the U.S., ensure there are opportunities for them to participate in church and community programs (meals, host homestays, participation in church gatherings and worship
- o Learn words and phrases in your partner's language(s)
- o Recognize diversity in gifts and strengths; receive the gifts of others: hospitality, life experience, evangelism, trades, vocations, occupations
- o Include children in the partnership through VBS, pen pals, Sunday school classes
- o Share training resources on a partnership or church website
- o Promote and support partners' leadership development (lay leader, pastor, elders and evangelists)
- o Promote and support leadership development, especially for women

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- C. Learn from one another through education and orientation
 - o Reverse ambassadorship and communicating the experience after a trip make this the expectation in training before you go (give a face to the place)
 - o Seek to understand and appreciate cultural/ethnic differences
 - o Be intentional about setting times for trips and visits
 - · Allow ample time for training and orientation
 - Include expectations of post-trip debriefing and storytelling with your church
 - o When partners visit, and even through virtual means and media, provide opportunities for them to participate in worship/church school/presbytery activities/schools to share news and culture
 - o Use a curriculum about mission for Sunday school, VBS, and youth group
 - o Seek information:
 - National news (print, TV and web)
 - Research relevant topical material history, biographies, mission texts
 - Use online information from PC(USA) resources, mission co-workers, universities

III. Partnership Development

- A. Be sure that there is agreement on purpose and plans
 - o Establish a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) or a partnership agreement; use it as a foundation for planning and evaluation
 - o Identify point of contact person(s) between partners
 - o Establish accountability
 - o Be sure that all voices are heard and that all "stakeholders" are on board
 - o Come together periodically to listen to partners and evaluate together
 - o Inform partnership leadership and seek approval when warranted
 - o Plan for sustainability
 - o Do reciprocal needs assessment
- B. Shape and share a common vision
 - o Seek spiritual guidance pray, wait, discern
 - o Plan retreats to build the relationship and develop a common vision
 - o Understand that a common vision is more than the project; use more than project language to shape vision
- C. Develop a structure that is based through channels and not individuals (see section III A)
 - o Leadership will change during the life of a partnership
 - o Know the community to know the channels
 - o Structure should be broad, not with just a pastor
 - o Share excerpts of minutes of session meetings, partnership meetings to know that you are working with an institution, community or group, not with an individual
 - o Create a partnership board, partnership committee, management committee
 - o Be inclusive of the whole community
 - o Share responsibilities
