The CCT Prayerfully Plans for the Future

The CCT met March 15–17, 2013, in Louisville. The Creative Ministries Offering Committee, Bible Study and Communications Coordination committees met beforehand.

On the 16th, the Leadership Enhancement Committee provided a session on adaptive leadership facilitated by Mary Elva Smith.

After a brief plenary session, the Mission Relationships, Leadership Enhancement, and Justice and Peace committees met all day on March 16. Finance, Funds Development, Audit and Antiracism committees met around the edges and during meals. Synod reps, racial ethnic members at large, and young women reps met the morning of the 17th.

During the business meeting March 17, the CCT heard committee reports and decided by consensus. Making the Case, a program evaluation tool, was presented. Gloria Chough led closing worship. An offering of \$3,828 was received for the PW Mission Pledge. In addition, CCT members and staff pledged \$4045 for 2013. CCT members have reached 84 percent participation in giving/pledging!



Adaptive Leadership Training and Intergenerational Dialogue

The Leadership Enhancement Committee (LEC) sponsored a full-day **Adaptive Leadership** training for the CCT facilitated by Mary Elva Smith. Data gathered from the meeting will be shared with the CCT. Participants are encouraged to apply the skills and knowledge gained in their PW work and other leadership roles.

Participants engaged actively in conversation and appreciated the opportunity to interact outside their regular meetings and to think about leadership in new ways.

In conjunction with the 57th **Commission on the Status of Women** (CSW) (see

p. 5) held at the UN in March, LEC sponsored an intergenerational dialogue, with 49 women participating. The group was divided into three generational cohort groupings. The discussion was linked to the theme of CSW, the elimination and prevention of all forms of violence against women and girls, providing the opportunity early in the week for participants to get to know each other and share their personal experiences. It was interesting and surprising to see the number of shared themes across all groups. See page 5 for more information on LEC.

36 Thank Offering Projects Funded

The Creative Ministries Offering Committee met March 14–15 in Louisville to review 57 **Thank Offering** proposals of which 36 will be funded (27 in the U.S. and 9 international). Half of the projects are for health ministries. Projects focused on a range of basic needs—providing food or housing for the homeless, meeting food needs of families, providing legal services to immigrants or people seeking asylum, providing shelter/housing to veterans and victims of domestic violence. Total project funding from the 2012 Thank Offering is \$705,000. More funding information is available on p. 6.

One Love, One Heart, One Community—Visions of Hope in the Islands of the Sea (Isaiah 11:11)

Dahlia Vela, Maria Arroyo, Kathy Reeves and Susan Jackson Dowd met with partners from the Caribbean and North America Council for Mission (CANACOM) in Kingston, Jamaica, January 2013 to begin planning the 2014 Global Exchange to the Caribbean scheduled for November 4–18, 2014. The trip will focus on violence and reconciliation, witness and evangelism, and leadership development.

The planning group met at Shirley Retreat Hotel, which is owned by the United Church of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands (UCJCI). UCJCI is a denomination formed from three Reformed denominations: Congregational, Disciples of Christ and Presbyterian. The group, which included CANACOM staff and

representatives from Jamaica, Cuba and Trinidad, spent a day getting to know one another in terms of organizations, missions and priorities.

CANACOM partners provided visits to the CANACOM and UCJCI offices and to three projects focused on women's and children's issues. The group enjoyed worship at the Hellshire UCJCI church and a trip to the beach. UCJCI members provided a cultural night featuring regional food and a celebration of folk music. Application forms will be available on the PW web page later this spring.

Mission Relationships

Sung Yeon Choi-Morrow reported on the trip that she, Kathy Reeves and Carissa Harold took to Ukraine to meet with Roma women about the **Roma Development Project**. The CCT affirmed MRC's recommendation to bring the project to an end because PW's three-year commitment has been made. There are 400 baskets in inventory. PW will partner with organizations working with Roma women on the ground, continue to receive gifts for the school, consider any Thank or Birthday Offering grant submitted to CMOC from ministries that support the Roma in Europe, and actively promote *Ten Days of Prayer and Thanksgiving for the Roma* for use by PW across the US.

The **Global Exchange Committee** brought a recommendation from CANACOM concerning the Caribbean islands to be visited by the 2014 Global Exchange. The MRC recommended that the islands to be visited be Trinidad (and possibly Guyana), Curacao and Dominican Republic. Orientation will be in Jamaica, debriefing in Miami (see above).

MRC endorsed a **study seminar** planned by PC(USA) mission coworkers in Central America November 26–December 7, 2013. PW's involvement will be publicizing the event in existing publications.

Antiracism

ARC's membership consists of three anti-racism facilitators and three CCT members—Barbara Allen, Synod of Mid-Atlantic; Ann Hinz, Synod of Alaska Northwest; Jacqueline Bryant Caleb, Synod of Trinity; Magdalene Lewis, CCT Synod of the Northeast rep serving on the J&P; Alice Koerner, CCT Synod of Rocky Mountains rep serving on MRC; and Susan Skoglund, CCT Synod of Southern CA/HI rep serving on LEC. All three programmatic committees of CCT are represented on ARC. This representation is intentional. ARC wants to work in partnership with all committees so that racial justice work can be mainstreamed in all that we do as Presbyterian Women.

ARC spent a day exploring the committee's directional priority and mission emphasis through the lens of race, paying particular attention to the relationship between the giver and receiver, at its 2012 annual meeting, with the help of Tom Priest who served as guest consultant. Alice Koerner reviewed three PW mission projects: USA Mission Experience, Roma Development Project and Baby Caps for Africa. Since the meeting, conversation has continued through conference call meetings. ARC is seeking ways to

partner with MRC to work on this jointly.

ARC stays in touch with Presbyterians committed to justice relations by sending updates quarterly on ARC activities.

ARC will introduce a resource on culturally proficient leadership at Big Tent in Louisville August 1-3, 2013. This daylong workshop (9–5) will be offered the day after Big Tent in partnership with two PC(USA) offices: Gender and Racial Justice and Multicultural Congregational Support. ARC will promote it locally, too, because people can register just for this event. Copies of the resource will be available at Big Tent and through PDS.

ARC will send two members to the 14th **White Privilege Conference** in Seattle April 10–13, 2013.

Communications Coordination

CCC recommended that **Korean Bible study** production be put on hiatus this year while need for the study is determined. Sales have fallen significantly over the years and PW translation policies state that translation requires a demonstrated need in the language constituency.

PW has translated the study into Spanish and Korean since 1988 and into Arabic as requested. The women's organization of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan is currently licensing several past Bible study manuscripts for translation into Mandarin Chinese and sales in Taiwan. The studies are in use by several thousand Presbyterians in Taiwan and some in the US.

LEC continues to work on expanding the **Sisters Stand and Walk Together** program and is assessing whether there are groups in which there is interest, energy and need for racial-ethnic and immigrant leader development.

Justice and Peace

The 57th United Nations Commission on the Status of Women concluded on Friday, March 15 in NYC. Over 70 Presbyterians from PW, Young Women's Leadership Development and others attended. Agreed conclusions were reached on the 15th by the 49 member states seated on the council; the draft includes language from talking points that Presbyterians and Ecumenical Women advocated for during the two weeks of the commission: cultural and structural violence against women, access to education including knowledge about reproductive health and rights, and special considerations for minority women and those living in rural areas. J&P is following up on new things learned at the commission, including disturbing stories of items used as feminine products in rural Africa. To follow up on the commission's theme of the elimination and prevention of violence against women and girls, J&P makes these recommendations:


Orange Days: The United Nation's Secretary-General's UNiTE to End Violence

against Women campaign proclaims every 25th of the month as Orange Day! The first in a series of Orange Days was launched on 25 July last year. Initiated and led by the UNiTE campaign's Global Youth Network, the action strives to highlight the issue of violence against women and girls, not just on 25 November (International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women), but every month. Orange Day aims to spark worldwide interest and conversation, highlight violence against women and girls as a violation of human rights, and call for its eradication without reservation, equivocation or delay. author for the theme selected last year. The author for the 2016–17 Bible study themed "who is Jesus?" is Christiane Hearlson. The theme for 2017 will be Hebrews. Author nominations are needed. Together in Action 2014! J&P met with MRC to evaluate participation in this year's Together in Action day addressing human trafficking. The two committees decided to repeat this for the next two years of the triennium. The day will continue to focus on human trafficking, as people are just beginning to get on board and learn about the issue through this year's day. There will be a few changes for 2014: Instead of one day, PWs will be invited to join in a week of advocacy addressing human trafficking, either beginning or ending with use of human trafficking awareness worship resources in Sunday worship. The week should center on

January 11, International Human Trafficking Awareness Day. This time, we will give more specific examples of actions groups can take, drawing on ideas that were used this year, as well.
