Joseph: Message to Pharaoh

Genesis 41:1-43; 45:4-11



In class today . . .

... we learned about Joseph, one of God's messengers. We

learned how Joseph interpreted Pharaoh's dreams and explained to Pharaoh what God was going to do. We learned that Joseph was able to interpret dreams because God gave him the ability to interpret dreams. We also took time to imagine the dreams we have and the ways we hope God will continue to work in our world today.

Talk with your child about . . .

Forest, Heather and Susan Gaber, illustrator. *Stone Soup.* Little Rock, AR: August House, 1998. Two weary and hungry travelers arrive in a quiet village where they are not treated with hospitality. They teach the villagers how to make stone soup and the villagers learn a valuable lesson in the process.

Guthrie, Donna and Dennis Hockerman, illustrator. *A Rose for Abby*. Nashville: Abingdon Press, 1998. Abby watches a homeless woman dig in the trash cans in her neighborhood. This event leads Abby to ask her neighbors for help. (*limited availability*)
