Chemical Engineering & B.S. Biochemistry at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He felt called to lead and bridge the 3rd generation Korean-Americans to the larger body of Christ. He received his Master of Divinity and Master of Theology (focused in Missions and Ecumenics) from Princeton Theological Seminary. Rev. Choi has served in a variety of contexts - from smallsized Korean immigrant church to large Anglo-churches; from children's ministry to the elderly as a pastor/intern. This experience has developed his passion for bridging the gaps between the different ethnic the and

developed his passion for bridging the gaps between the different ethnic the and generation groups through Word of God to build a church community that glorifies God with one mind and one voice regardless of one's background (Romans 15:6). Rev. Choi is currently serving as an associate pastor in charge of English ministry, youth, and education at the Korean Presbyterian Church of Fresno with his wife, Sophia, and daughter, Diana.

Bruce Gillette

Bruce Gillette serves as a co-pastor of Limestone Presbyterian Church in Wilmington, Delaware with his wife Carolyn Winfrey Gillette. They hosted Ghanaian Presbyterian Fellowship for five years before it became Olivet Presbyterian Church with its own building. Bruce currently serves as New Castle Presbytery Moderator. Bruce's past ecumenical work



includes serving on the Executive Committee of the Consultation on Church Union when it became Churches Uniting in Christ (he co-authored PCUSA's study guide on CUIC). The National Council of Churches commissioned him to write a research paper on efforts to recruit racial-ethnic pastors. He was also a steward at a World Council of Churches Central Committee meeting and the VI Assembly in Vancouver, Canada. He helped found the Sussex County (NJ) Habitat for Humanity, New Castle County (DE) Family Promise, Delaware Interfaith Power & Light, DE Coalition Against Gun Violence, Kairos Prison Ministry (DE), and is the Interfaith Resource Center (DE) Board President. He chaired the 2004 PCUSA GA Assembly Committee on Peacemaking, co-authored the study/action guide for the PCUSA GA study paper, *Transforming Families* and the ecumenical church guide to *Active Parenting Now,* and was a Big Tent 2015 workshop leader.



Gun Ho Lee

Rev. Dr. Gun Ho Lee has since 2010 served on the General Assembly Committee on Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations. For the past 13 years, he has served as Organizing Pastor of Korean Presbyterian Fellowship of Greenville and as Associate for Multicultural Ministries of the Presbytery of New Hope in NC. He served the Presbyterian Multicultural Network Board (now Presbyterian Intercultural Network Board) from 2005 to 2008 and has been serving it again from 2013 to the present.
